Hebrews 9 Is also Blatantly Misinterpreted

Paul writes: "Just as people are destined to die once, and after that to face judgment..." (v. 27)

He is simply rhetorically referring to what is irrefutable, that death is a one-off occurence, an irreversible finality.

(Only beginning last century, of course, were methods developed to resuscitate people who would have been considered dead previously.)

And, yes: The Divine consider how things went after ones lifetime on Earth.. not least while arranging, designing ones destiny in ones next lifetime.

It is understandable some unable to accept the reality of reincarnation seize on believing Paul's statement affirms their fervent wish and hopes they are only having to endure being confined inside a body on Earth once.

But one able to notice the more than a dozen references to Reincarnation across all four Gospels realizes this single, solitary clause is no counterweight whatsoever..

Plus:

There is certainly no evidence Paul disagreed with what all his fellow Jews considered true then, had no doubt a human being experiences multiple lifetimes in a body on Earth.. as did pretty much everybody incarnated everywhere on Earth back then.

Furthermore: Reincarnation acceptance is still common, if not the dominant view among Jews alive on Earth nowadays.
